Chairman's Chat By Andy Moss

As always our annual Track Day at Castle Combe was a very enjoyable event. We were very lucky with the weather with the sun staying out to the end of the day. There are pictures later in Backfire and on the club website, as well as some really nice feedback from

those taking part - thanks to all who took the time to comment. I would like to add my thanks to all those involved in organising, both before and on the day, as well as to everyone who supported the event itself. I spent a lot of time chatting in between runs - as always the social aspect of a day such as this is a big part of making the day and the club so enjoyable.

For September we have a fun low cost competitive event when we return to Rolls Royce, this time for an Autosolo. Alan Spencer is organising and the plan is to run some timed driving tests around the cones - the event will be about having some fun competitive driving that is suitable for both the seasoned entrant and those new to motorsport. Any normal road car should be suitable – No helmet or competition license is required and the entry fee is just £10 so come along and join in.

The day after the Autosolo we have something a little different for our September Club Night. Bob Hart will be running a navigation tutorial which is an ideal introduction for anyone who fancies entering an event involving plotting a route on a map, including our own Navigation Exercise later in the winter. Ideally bring OS map 172 and a pencil, but we will have a few spare maps available on the night. Even if you have entered navigation events in the past you are bound to learn something from Bob, or if you don't fancy map reading just come along and have a drink and a chat.

The regulations are now also available for our Castle Combe Pegasus Sprint in October, which, once again, will be an event firmly targeted at road and sports cars. So far the response has been excellent with entries coming faster than ever. Competitors will again start from the normal pit lane exit and complete a full lap of the circuit, before crossing the finish line and returning off the circuit via the same route. This format allows enough time for full four runs, giving the traditional two practice and two timed runs. Hopefully we will get a nice warm autumn day!

At the start of October the club will again be at the Castle Combe Autumn Classic meeting, which last year was an excellent event. We will again have our own stand, which will feature a display of cars organised by Nick Wood, as well as a display about the club and our involvement in the early days of the 500cc formula - you can read more about this later in Backfire. The event continues to grow, thanks in no small part to the efforts of circuit archivist and long time club member Pete Stowe, who puts an amazing amount of effort into the event.

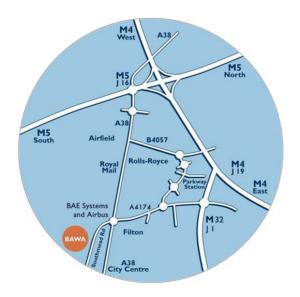

Mille Miglia With The Allards 14th-17th May 2015

Mamma Mia! Here we go again!! What a fabulous trip Peter and I had watching parts of the famous Thousand Mile Classic Car Event round Italy.

This race was first run in 1927 and continued for thirty years. Today, though no longer a "race", it attracts hundreds of participants from all over the world; car collectors, champions, famous faces, old and new enthusiasts. The town of Brescia is the event's traditional start and finish, with the cars driving along twisty mountain roads, cobbled streets, and through sleepy villages and major cities, from dawn to dusk for four days and covering 1,760 kms with stages in Rimini, Rome and Parma.

This was our second visit to the Mille Miglia, again impeccably arranged by Steve Furby of Motor Passion Ltd. Together with the ever helpful Chantal and the charismatic Tiff Needell who entertained us throughout with his infectious enthusiasm, the trip went without a hitch. Their attention to detail as to choice of boutique hotels, transportation, viewing arrangements and wonderful meals, was second to none and our group of like minded enthusiasts was great fun throughout.

Among the over 450 cars there were many Maseratis, Fiats, Lancias, Cisitalias and Alfa Romeos and 19 Ferraris including Brit Tony Best driving his 1952 Ferrari 212.



On Day One we met the rest of our group at a welcome reception at the lakeside Park Hotel, Desenzano, Lake Garda. From there we transferred in Mercedes SUV's to the Mille Miglia Museum, a converted monastery, in Brescia for a private guided tour. Here some of the most beautiful vintage cars that took part in the Mille Miglia from 1927 to 1957 are displayed, perfectly preserved or restored many still take part in the most important evocative races in the world.

On arrival we spotted the charming Sir Stirling Moss and Hans Hermann, ex Mercedes and Porsche sports car driver, (both now well in their 80's) at the far end of the courtyard, together with three silver arrow sports cars, awaiting a Mercedes photo shoot. This did not deter husband Peter who had met Stirling on various occasions from striding across to the great man for a chat! His lovely wife Susie gave him a seat and they chatted for quite some time, not only holding up our tour of the museum, but also the entire Mercedes presentation! A fabulous dinner followed our tour in the museum's own trattoria, used by drivers from days gone by, with the atmosphere building before the following day's start of the iconic event.

The morning of Day Two saw us mingling with half of Italy, it seemed, in the main Piazza Vittoria in Brescia. To the sound of the engines and the aroma of Castrol R, we watched the treasured cars assemble, flying the flag for the UK we saw Jodie Kidd in a Jaguar XK120, James Martin and Charley Boorman in their Jaguar D type

and Derek Bell in a Jaguar C type as well as many other British drivers who are regular Mille Miglia participants.

James Hunt's former team mate and Le Mans winner Jochen Mass was a popular competitor in a magnificent SSK Mercedes. The atmosphere was hotting up, as was the heat of the day, we enjoyed a glass or two of vino before returning to Desenzano where a delicious lunch awaited us as we watched the cars drive past on their way to Rimini.

We then went to Bologna, where we stayed at the Hotel Commercianti, before an early

start on the third day for a visit to the Republic of San Marino. Here we took the cable car up to Motor Passion's reserved grandstand in the old square after breakfast was served opposite in the Osteria Taverna. For two hours we watched the cars draw up a couple of meters away for photographs and interviews with the drivers. An amazing lunch in the Osteria, a place where Enzo Ferrari used to dine followed. Our menu comprised zucchini flowers filled with cheese and vegetables on a fresh tomato sauce, homemade pasta with baby broad beans and pecorino cheese, local beef in red wine sauce and strawberry salad with fresh local cheese ice cream all accompanied by wonderful Italian wine! Back in Bologna that evening pizzas, salads and more wine rounded off an incredible day.



On the Saturday, Day Four, Peter and I took the little Noddy Train from the main square through the cobbled streets of old Bologna up to the Basilica di San Luca, rising majestically out of the mist. Sadly, Bologna, known as the Red City due to the warm tones of its roofs, facades and terra cotta bricks, did not look so attractive. In fact, the city is daubed throughout with graffiti and the brickwork on nearly all the wonderful porticos is crumbling and in need of urgent repair. At 6 am that morning, the Mille Miglia

participants had left Rome, driving northward and arriving in Parma at about 9 pm. A gruelling day for them driving over challenging mountain roads. We were treated to a farewell dinner held in true Italian fashion in an out of town farmhouse restaurant, "La Bottega da Franco". One course after another was served by friendly family staff, wine flowed and happy conversations increased in volume as the evening wore on, with all of us vowing to return for next year's event.

All commission to Wiltshire Air Ambulance

500s - Formulated in Filton in '45

The Club will again be providing the main trophy for the 500cc Formula 3 race at the Castle Combe Autumn Classic race meeting on Saturday 3rd October. This year is a significant anniversary as it was seventy years ago, on 10th December 1945, that the formula was conceived at a Club meeting at Pegasus House in Filton. The following article describes that evening's events.

On the evening of December 10th, 1945, around 100 members of the Bristol Aeroplane Company Motor Sports Club, with a few invited experts and guests, crowded into the Company's conference room at Filton to discuss proposals for a new racing car formula for the "impecunious enthusiast".



The outcome – a draft 'National 500cc Racing Car Formula'.

So began 70 years of 500s.

The December 1945 meeting was the culmination of around twelve months of discussion among motorsport enthusiasts in Bristol, however their underlying interest led back several years more. When possible during the World War Two years enthusiasts looked forward to the time when the sport could resume, and considered ways by which the 'ordinary working man' might be able to go 'proper' motor racing, a big change from pre-war days when it was generally the preserve of the very wealthy. Various ideas were aired in the motoring press, such as 'The Motor' and 'Motor Sport', that was still being published, and were no doubt also discussed by devotees around the country. The huge Bristol Aeroplane Company factory in Filton numbered many such enthusiasts among its workforce, where native Bristolians had been joined by like-minded individuals from further afield. By late 1944, with the war's end in sight, they formed a new club, the Bristol Aeroplane Company Motor Sports Club - for Company employees only – in preparation for a resumption of motorsport.

With several successful special builders (such as Walter Watkins and Jan Breyer) among their number, and enthused by guest speaker John Bolster's discourse on 'Specials' at a Club meeting in October '45, the time was ripe for action. Particularly as amongst them was RD 'Dick' Caesar.

A prolific special builder himself (over a dozen pre-war) Dick Caesar was a keen proponent of low cost racing for fun. With a few friends, in the late 1930s he had created a racing club for cheap home-built specials on a grass track at his home in Clapton-in-Gordano, north Somerset. Known as CAPA – derived from the initials of the five founder members' names: **C**aesar, Franklin **C**oombs, **A**drian Butler, RD

'Bobby' **P**rice, and KR (believed to be Keith) **A**ldridge – this provided an excellent background to post-war ambitions to create something suitable for proper sealed surface tracks.

Caesar had in October 1944 initially proposed a 'Cadet' class using stock Ford 10 or similar engines. Elsewhere Kenneth Neve, for one, had been proposing a 500cc-engined formula. A key episode occurred in the winter of 1944/45 when Jan Breyer, publicity secretary of the new BACMSC, brought Caesar and Neve together. Breyer and Neve were old friends, and when Neve visited Bristol on business Breyer arranged for him to meet Caesar, along with other local men Pat McCormick and Eric Storey, with Joe Fry also turning up. After a beneficial exchange of ideas, Caesar was persuaded that a 500 class was the way forward, and then worked on the scheme behind the scenes over the next few months.

Anxious to get something definite done, and with the idea "If you want something done, go ahead and do it yourself", the BACMSC committee took the initiative and duly organised a meeting to discuss the future of 500cc car racing for 10th December 1945. That night, in an atmosphere of "sheer enthusiasm", over 100 bodies crowded into the Main Conference Room of the BAC's headquarters building Filton House (now headquarters of Airbus UK and known as Pegasus House) at the top of Filton hill. With limited space, there was just room for representatives of a few local clubs to join the Club members, plus a panel of experts invited along to provide technical guidance.

The panel comprised George Hack, formerly chief of the Rudge motorcycle racing department, and then working in the BAC Engines Department, and Bath based

engineers Roland Cross, of rotary valve fame, and suspension specialist Sydney Horstmann. And of course Dick Caesar.

Chairing the session was former Bentley man, Autocar's Sports Editor Sammy Davis, who opened the evening by emphasizing that Grand Prix cars built at fantastic expense were not essential to provide sport. "Real sport and real racing could be had with 500 c.c. cars costing under £100 to build and cheap to run. Such cars, properly built and capable of 80 to 90 m.p.h. would need exact limits to bind the design. It was up to the Meeting to decide what it wanted."

Following on, Caesar showed his films of pre-war CAPA racing to illustrate the possibilities, then, following a prepared agenda, the audience was asked to express its wishes, to which the panel of experts responded with advice.

In brief the conclusions of the meeting were:

<u>Types of Racing</u>: All types of racing would be included, particularly circuit racing as well as a special class for 500 c.c. jobs at the usual sprints and hill climbs.

<u>Types</u> of <u>Circuit</u>: 500 c.c. class races are almost certain to run at the big tracks as well as any suitable circuits that can be found or made, including hard grass as at C.A.P.A.

<u>Scratch Racing</u>: To be aimed at where possible.

<u>Cost of Cars</u>: By personal toil and cunning the special builders thought the outlay could be kept to £40 - £80 but Mr. Hack thought a professionally built job would cost at least £180.

Engines: Not more than two cylinders. Superchargers barred (to keep down cost).

<u>Fuel Regulations</u>: Considerable controversy over this. In the end, there was a tendency in favour of pump petrol (again, to keep cost down).

<u>Fuel Tanks</u>: To be limited to two gallons.

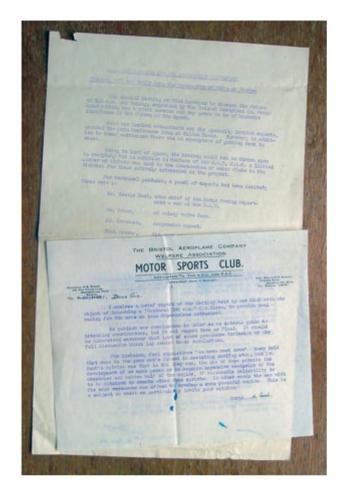
Weight of Cars: Mr. Hack and Mr. Caesar thought this should be around 450 lb.

Scrutineering: Rigid and impartial scrutineering is essential.

Gear Boxes: Optional, motor-cycle types would be suitable.

Body Work: Optional.

Towards the end of the meeting, the audience were asked who would be prepared to build cars. With around 30 people saying they would, the scheme was deemed viable.



Following this successful meeting, the conclusions were published and widely circulated as an interim guide to potential builders.

The next move was an open meeting, held at the Anchor Hotel in Filton, next to the BAC factory, on 25th March 1946 where the 'National 500cc car class' formula (now incorporating a few changes to the initial proposals) was finalised.

Meanwhile the first cars were already under construction, with the Strang and Tiger Kitten making their debuts at Prescott hillclimb in May.

With the new formula successfully devised and launched the pioneering Bristol committee, realising that a National formula needed a dedicated National Club to administer it, in August 1946 set up the 500 Club in Bristol, with a committee drawn from those individuals involved in its creation.

The circular issued after the 10th December meeting had opened with the heading:

REAL MOTOR RACING FOR THE IMPECUNIOUS ENTHUSIAST
Bristol well and truly lays the Foundation of 500 c.c. Racing

continuing

The special Meeting on 10th December to discuss the future of 500 c.c. car racing, organised by The Bristol Aeroplane Co. Motor Sports Club, was a great success and may prove to be of historic importance to the future of the Sport.

Seventy years on (and counting), we may safely endorse those remarks, and the Bristol Pegasus Motor Club (successor to the BACMSC) will to commemorate that historic December 1945 meeting at the BACMSC Challenge Trophy race for 500s at the Castle Combe Autumn Classic on 3rd October.
